KINGSTON REGIONAL HERITAGE FAIR 2014

The Kingston Regional Heritage Fair brings together students and their communities in a public celebration of their personal and community stories as Kingstonians, Ontarians and Canadians. As the first Youth Heritage Fair in Ontario and one of the first five such fairs in Canada, Kingston celebrated its 19th year in 2014.

This year's fair combined elements of past fairs with new innovations, creating a new format designed to actively engage everyone involved.

PRE-FAIR

OUR NEW WEBSITE AT WWW.KRHF.CA

The Kingston Heritage Fair committee applied for and received a grant from the City of Kingston Heritage Fund to develop a new website. The website provides a powerful communication tool for the fair. It connects the Fair to its main audiences: schools, the heritage community, sponsors, volunteers and the public. The site was launched in April, 2014, just in time for schools to register their students for the May 1, 2014 Fair.

REGISTRATION

Participating schools used the online registration system to register students chosen to represent them at the Regional Fair. Students were able to register using a set username and password. Teachers found the online registration system efficient and the registrar was able to create data lists for colour groups, name tags, judging rubrics and workshops.

The registration section of the website also allowed the Fair committee to post and update fair materials such as permission and media release forms, ideas for projects, plus teacher information packages, for interested schools, teachers and students.

An online registration section for volunteers outlines the various areas of the Fairs program requiring volunteers and allows potential volunteers to indicate their areas of interest.

STUDENT PROJECT PROFILES

Several student projects from the past two years were chosen for profile on the site. A photo of the student and project plus a short description of the project and the importance of the person or event to Canadian and/or Kingston history are featured. These profiles can be used by students wishing to participate in the future as exemplars of outstanding work and also help preserve the diverse stories of Kingston and Canada. This year's gold medal winners will be posted in time for the next year's fair season.

As well as static projects, the committee has posted videos produced by our local Young Citizens for the national video contest program sponsored by Canada's History. Videos from 2012 and 2013 are already posted and the 2014 videos will be posted this fall. 2014 VENUE

THE ACTIVITIES

ON-SITE REGISTRATION

Upon arrival at the Fair, students checked in and received their name tag, their colour group allocation, a complimentary water bottle, a participation ribbon plus details on where in the gymnasium to set up their project.

OPENING CEREMONIES

The gymnasium was the main venue for this year's fair with all student projects set-up on long rows of tables provided and set-up by the Faculty of Education staff the day before the event.

Rhona Gale, Chair of the 2014 Fair, welcomed the participants and introduced them to their group leaders. As part of the new format the bleachers in the gymnasium were opened for the opening. At the end of the brief ceremony, students were introduced to the group leaders, mainly recent graduates from the Faculty of Education, who would guide them through the day's activities.



ACTIVITY ROTATIONS



The four colour groups rotated through activities that included: project adjudication, heritage workshops, visits to community groups and peer judging. The morning and afternoon sessions were broken up by a shared lunch break. Group members remained together throughout the day, supervised by in some cases two volunteer leaders.

ADJUDICATION

Students researched topics of their choice and presented them at the school level. Teachers then chose exceptional students and their projects to represent their schools at the Regional Fair. 72 projects, produced by 133 students, were adjudicated by the volunteer community judges.

Before their adjudication session, the judges participated in an orientation session that outlined the criteria of the judging rubric and the requirements for the various prizes. Each project was adjudicated by at least three different judges and the sharing of the many diverse topics was enjoyed by both the students and their adjudicators.

PEER JUDGING

As part of their community group rotation students were given the opportunity to visit the student projects and participate in some peer judging.

Each student participated in two heritage workshops located in the main library teaching area, outside in the courtyard and in classrooms on the second floor.

Medals for Gold, Silver and Bronze were presented for Grades 4/5, Grade 6, Grade 7 and Grade 8 in the name of our local sponsors. Representatives from the Grade 6, Grade 7 and Grade 8Gold winner projects were selected to attend the Ontario Provincial Fair in Toronto, June 14 and 15, 2014.
